

SPECIAL CALENDAR DATES

July 30-Aug 2 is North American Triumph Challenge XII, known elsewhere in the country as the Vintage Triumph Register National Convention. We have been talking up this event for almost a year and now it is upon us. This year the convention will take place in Gainsville, Georgia, near Atlanta. Convention headquarters will be the Holiday Inn, Gainsville. You should plan to leave here on Wednesday July 29 and expect to return on August 3, unless you are going to sightsee, or fly down. There will be at least 1 caravan leaving sometime early in the morning of July 29th, probably from the Lincoln Oasis on I-80/94, arriving (hopefully) in Gainsville around midday July 30.

This year's meet will include high speed UNTIMED laps of the Road Atlanta race circuit. You must complete a drivers' school at the circuit to qualify for the high speed runs, which will be untimed in the interest of safety. There will also be a timed slalom in the Road Atlanta paddock. Also included in NATC XII will be a pair of rallies; a TSD and a fun rally, parts auction, pool party, a driving tour, group photo, and more. The Concours judging will include people's choice balloting, and the awards banquet will feature noted Triumph driver Ken Richardson. Of course, the traveling Roadster Factory, with Mastercard and Visa blanks, will be there. Charles Runyan and the Roadster Factory crew are also bringing 3 cars: The TR250 that recently came in 21st in the One Lap of America, the Triumph TRS that was first shown at our convention at Pheasant Run in 1985, and a Le Mans Spitfire. All in all, it should be another great Triumph convention, plan to be in on the fun. Caravan details and sign up sheets will be at the next meeting.

Sept 13 is the date for the first event sponsored by the newly formed British Car Union. This will be a day for British car owners and enthusiasts. The location will be Danada Farms in Wheaton. Put this on your calendar of things to do. We will have more details at the meeting.

July is a busy month for us, especially since many of us will be going to Atlanta for NATC XII. We will have our July meeting on July 5th at the Round Up Saloon, 4152 Roosevelt Rd, Hillside. Our meeting will start promptly at 7:30ish, maybe. This is an important meeting for those of you who are planning to attend NATC XII in Atlanta. At the meeting, we will discuss departure times and first night layover plans. If you are planning on going to the convention and wish to join the caravan, we strongly suggest you attend this meeting. Another major topic of this meeting will be the British Car Festival scheduled for September 13. We will have important information regarding this event (like where the hell is Danada Farms?). It should be a good meeting, hope to see you there.

The Mini Series for novice rallyists continues on July 11 & August 8, from the Firestone Auto Center in Woodfield Mall, Schaumburg. This is a great way to learn about time, speed, distance (TSD) rallying. Registration for all Minis is 5:45 PM and the first car is off at 7:01.

Vintage races are gaining popularity all around the country. One of the first groups to get started in racing vintage cars is based in Chicago. Known as Chicago Historic Races, Ltd., the organizer is Joe Marchetti, whose family owns the Como Inn, and who is an internationally known Ferrari aficionado. Their annual event will be held at Road America, Elkhart Lake, Wi. on July 17, 18 & 19. We are organizing a tour to go up there on the 19th. 

THE HOME-BUILT RACER




Seymour had an inferior car.
